Featured Speaker: Brian K. Blount

President and Professor of New Testament at Union Theological Seminary
and Presbyterian School of Christian Education in Richmond, Virginia.

If you want the gospel in its most direct, most urgent, most dramatic form—go to Mark. Matthew’s Gospel has the Sermon on the Mount, with its beautiful antitheses; Luke’s, the parables of the Prodigal Son and the Good Samaritan; John’s, the long, deep discourses; Mark, however, begins with a direct declaration, “The beginning of the good news of Jesus Christ, the son of God,” and takes off from there.

The proclamation of John the Baptist, Jesus’ baptism and his being tempted in the wilderness, the arrest of John, Jesus beginning his public ministry with the proclamation that the kingdom of God is at hand, his calling the first disciples, his astonishing teaching in the synagogue, his casting out of the unclean spirits and their recognizing him as the Holy One of God, the healing of Simon’s mother-in-law, the crowds and the healings and the exorcisms, the still-larger crowds, everyone looking for Jesus, his preaching in the synagogues, the healing of the leper, the even-larger crowds so that Jesus could not go into a town openly—and all of that is only the first chapter! To read Mark’s Gospel—and especially to read it straight through from beginning to end—is to understand both the astonishment that Jesus generated and the urgency with which the early church proclaimed him as risen Lord and Savior.

This year, for our Festival of Faith, Second Presbyterian Church, will have the opportunity to experience and reflect upon the power of Mark’s Gospel, and the good news that it proclaims.

Our featured speaker will be Brian K. Blount, President and Professor of New Testament at

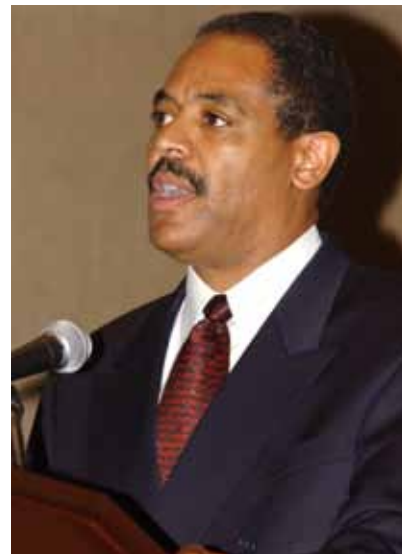

Union Theological Seminary and Presbyterian School of Christian Education in Richmond, Virginia. Dr. Blount was called to this position in 2007, after serving for 15 years as the Richard J. Dearborn Professor of New Testament Interpretation at Princeton Theological Seminary. Dr. Blount graduated from the College of William and Mary and Princeton Seminary; he also served for six years as pastor of the Carver Memorial Presbyterian Church in Newport News, Virginia. Dr. Blount has written and edited several books including, *Go Preach: Mark's Kingdom Message and the Black Church Today*, and *Preaching Mark in Two Voices*. He is an extraordinary preacher and teacher.

Joining Dr. Blount will be Kirianne Weaver Riehl, pastor of the United Presbyterian Church of Northville, NY. Like Dr. Blount, Rev. Riehl is a graduate of Princeton Theological Seminary; she is fondly remembered here at Second Presbyterian for her ministry as Lake Fellow, as well as for her performance of Mark's Gospel.

In one of his books, Dr. Blount writes that we are “wired for God, wired by God with a human spirit that despite its limitations can be touched by God's Holy Spirit . . . it is how we hear God.” We hope that this year's Festival of Faith will be a time when the Spirit touches us so we can hear God through the Gospel of Mark.

"The beginning of the good news of Jesus Christ, the Son of God." **MARK 1:1**

Dear Friends:

I suspect that each one of us has a particular passage, story or book of Scripture that holds special meaning for us. Over the years, I have found myself drawn time and again to the Gospel of Mark. It may have something to do with its brevity, rough hewn character or the breakneck speed with which Mark tells the story of Jesus' life, death and resurrection. Mark's favorite word seems to be immediately, a word he uses 42 times in his short book. Mark can barely get one story out before he rushes headlong into another story of Jesus.



A part of what attracts me to Mark is that it is the first gospel written and Mark becomes a foundation for Matthew and Luke as they weave their gospel stories. I also like the way Mark keeps the identity of Jesus a secret from the other characters in the story until the end when Jesus is dying on the cross. As I read Mark, I wonder when the disciples will finally

figure out who he is. I never cease being amazed at what is believed to be the original ending of the gospel when the women run from the empty tomb and don't tell anyone what they have seen and heard because they are afraid (See Mk 16:8). Mark is full of surprises, rough edges and great power.

Our Festival of Faith weekend, Feb. 26-28, will give us a special opportunity to explore the gospel of Mark together with an old friend and a new friend. Our former Lake Fellow, the Rev. Kirianne Weaver, who is now the Pastor of the United Presbyterian Church of Northville, NY, will offer a dramatic presentation of the entire Gospel of Mark. We are delighted to welcome Kirianne back to Second for this special event. Our keynote speaker will be the Rev. Dr. Brian Blount, President of Union Presbyterian Seminary in Richmond, VA, and a former Professor of New Testament at Princeton Theological Seminary. Dr. Blount has published extensively on many subjects including books on both Mark and Revelation. He is an internationally known and dynamic preacher and teacher of the faith. We are privileged to have Dr. Blount as our guest for the weekend.

I hope you will join us for the 2010 Festival of Faith as our study of the gospel of Mark enriches our understanding and leads us to deeper faith in Jesus Christ.

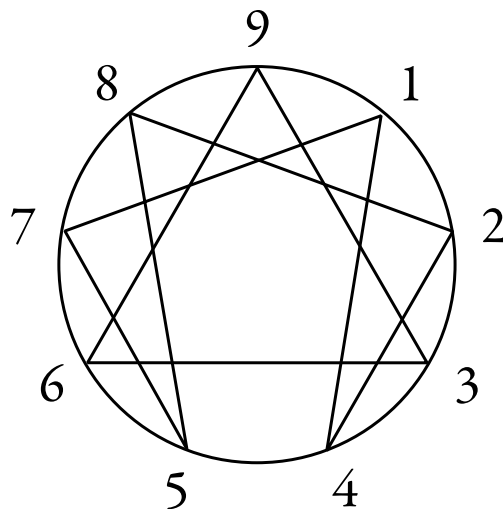

On A Mission ... Westminster Neighborhood Ministries

More than 25 years ago Second Presbyterian partnered with Westminster Presbyterian to provide support for families on the near east side of Indianapolis. This alliance evolved into Westminster Neighborhood Ministries, a program of the Whitewater Valley Presbytery.

Although Westminster Presbyterian Church has a small congregation, the needs of the immediate neighborhood are great. Westminster is on N. State Street, a few blocks from Arsenal Tech High School and the former women's prison.

Westminster Neighborhood Ministries' expanding list of programs includes:

- ❖ After school program for elementary and middle school students
- ❖ Full-time summer program for local children
- ❖ Preschool program (began in 2009)
- ❖ Weekly food pantry on Thursday mornings
- ❖ Weekly community lunch on Thursdays
- ❖ Visits by Genessaret Free Health Clinic
- ❖ Legal aid for community members

Second Presbyterian continues to be a major supporter of Westminster Neighborhood Ministries providing financial assistance, as well as volunteers, who serve in many ways such as:

- ❖ After school mentors,
- ❖ Food pantry volunteer,
- ❖ Legal aid volunteers, and
- ❖ Volunteers on Saturday work days to maintain the building.

In addition to financial and volunteer support, Second donates funds from the annual Souper Bowl event to stock the Westminster food pantry. Food donations collected at Second also go to Westminster.

Faith Presbyterian and Irvington Presbyterian, as well as other congregations, are also very involved in Westminster's programs.

Members of Second have found innovative ways to help at Westminster. The MOMs Bible study group has hosted parties involving children of both Second and Westminster. One of our members started teaching English to some of the Hispanic women who visit the food pantry. Last summer Second volunteers helped the children of the summer program build and tend a garden at Westminster. The youngsters enjoyed fresh food they had grown themselves.

Enjoy a special Lenten Concert Sunday, March 7 at 4 pm in the Sanctuary, featuring Second's Sanctuary Choir, Northminster Presbyterian Church's Chancel Choir and Festival Orchestra. A freewill offering will be taken.

Director of Music & Fine Arts Dr. Michelle Louer has chosen lush and exciting works by Czech composers Antonín Dvořák and Leos Janáček for this Anima Sacra Series highlight.

Hear Antonín Dvořák's familiar *New World Symphony* (1893) and *Te Deum* (1892) written by the Czech Republic's best known composer, who lived from 1841 to 1904. In *New World*, his most famous composition, Dvořák looked for inspiration from American melodies rather than Old World models.

Leos Janáček's *Otče náš* (Our Father) dates from 1901, incorporating tenor solo, chorus, harp and organ in a five movement work. This least accessible Czech composer lived from 1854 to 1928, and loved language with its flow and abrupt pauses.
